Ahoy April Club Members!

A few months ago, I began looking to purchase a sailboat. I found the search process to be very challenging on where and how to go about finding a boat. I thought I would share my experience to assist any of you who may be looking to buy a boat. First, I would recommend, if possible, to begin your search in Summer or Fall while boats are still in the water. It is difficult and uncomfortable climbing ladders and under tarps to adequately view a boat. While some boats may be stored indoors, the vast majority are outside in the cold.

I basically used three approaches in conducting my search. First was to access online websites listing sailboats for sale. The websites I found to be the most comprehensive are: Boat Trader, YachtWorld, Sailboat Listings, Craigslist, and Facebook (Great Lakes Boats for Sale – Group).

Secondly, I leveraged my sailing network of friends from NWSA, Sail Chicago and other personal acquaintances. They provided me with many leads of people planning to sell their boat.

Lastly, I contacted local sailboat dealerships (used and new) and provided them with information on the type of boat I was looking for. I strongly suggest establishing a relationship with the boat sales dealers as they can alert you in advance of a boat that is coming on the market. This is extremely valuable in a tight sailboat market. These are the local sailboat dealers I have been interacting with that have both new and used sailboat inventory: Larsen's Marine – Waukegan Harbor, Crowley's Marine – Chicago, Nautical Donations (used boats only) - Chicago.

While I reached out to some sailboat brokers, I did not have much success in getting their assistance. This was primarily due to the fact they deal with the 'higher end' market of larger and more expensive boats than what I was looking for.

These are just a few of many sources you can use in your sailboat search. I would like your comments on other sources you may have used.



Although a very brief description of each sail is posted online, more descriptive details will be provided in the Communique. Most sails have a gathering time of 10:30AM but the final decision for the meeting time and "afterwards" will be decided by the cruise captain and skippers and communicated to the crew one or two days before the sail.

Skippers and crew, I **strongly encourage** signing up for the sails as soon as possible. Early sign-up truly expedites the responsibilities of the Cruise Captain for providing assignments to various boats. And... speaking of Cruise Captains, they are the linchpin for the sails. And here is where I encourage those who have not held this position before to volunteer for the upcoming season. Serving as a Cruise Captain is a great way to meet other members and provide volunteer time for our volunteer organization. The responsibilities for this position are listed step-by-step in the membership directory and involve a minimal amount of phone time/online emails or texts.

So, with Covid almost out of sight (fingers crossed), hopefully this year will provide greater opportunities for sailing and social gatherings. Of course, there's always the weather but optimistically speaking, here's to a great season of sailing, socializing, and many pink skies at night...you know the rest.

### MAY 21- NORTH HARBORS SAIL

An early season opener for the skippers of the North Harbors-Northpoint Marina, Waukegan, Kenosha, and Racine. This will be the first "Shakedown" sail of the season, getting out the cobwebs (or bird's nests), from the winter storage, and finishing some of the finer details of the Spring tune-up. As with our June 11 sail, this could be a great opportunity to learn many of the necessary "tricks of the sailing trade" for preparing a boat for smooth sailing in the summer ahead. And, depending on what mother nature provides, it could also be an enjoyable brisk late Spring sail on Lake Michigan.

### JUNE 11: ALL HARBORS SHAKEDOWN SAIL

Scheduled for June 11, our second sail of the season will involve both Chicago and northern harbors. For some of our skippers who launched their boats in April, their shakedown sails are history. But for many of our members, this will be the first sail of the season and perhaps an opportunity for crew to learn some of the elements and refinements involved in the finishing touches of the Spring launch. Some skippers may be looking for help launching their boat and "taking it upriver," so keep an eye out for any blasts or invitations in the Chat room on the front NWSA website.

### JUNE 18: KENOSHA HARBOR; MEMORIAL SAIL

June 18 is the first of our Kenosha sails. Kenosha currently supports the majority of the boats in NWSA fleet and has many opportunities for a variety of after- sail gatherings. The sail this year will be our first Memorial Sail commemorating the past members who have given significantly to NWSA not only by donating time as skippers, cruise captains, and Board members but by personally mentoring many of the members over many years and making themselves available for everything from boat launching to sanding bottoms (of boats) and personally teaching the many aspects of sailing, boat maintenance, and essentially the love of sailing. ## **Joyce Clifford**



Your boat just hit a partially submerged floating cargo container that must have fallen off the cargo ship we saw at a distance while crossing Lake Michigan. Our boat is beginning to take on water and sink. You need to make a Mayday call!

There is a "procedure" for sending out a distress call. All you really need to know is to turn your VHF radio to Channel 16 and set it at the highest power setting (strongest signal). Key the mike by pressing the talk button and say one of the three phrases three times (discussed latter). Provide your position / location and situation information. Most VHF radios on recreational boats are simplex (vs duplex). That means only one person can speak at a time. You must release the push to talk button when finished speaking and listen for a response. It helps to say "over" when you are finished speaking, so the person at the other end knows you are finish speaking and can reply.

Here's a hypothetical MAYDAY call from a 36-foot sailing vessel, Caribbean Soul (reference to real people, events and boat name is purely coincidental 🐵)

"Mayday, Mayday, Mayday. This is the Caribbean Soul. Our position is 42 degrees, 32.147 minutes north; 84 degrees, 48.996 minutes west. We are sinking." Remember every radio is different, some display Lat / Long in decimal degrees like 42.536 degrees west, 32.817 north or in degrees, minutes, and seconds.

Try to speak slowly and clearly. Repeat this information three times, then release the push to talk button. The essential information is "Mayday", your position, and your emergency. If you have time, describe your boat and how many are aboard:

"We are a 36-foot sailing vessel, white hull and sails, and teal Bimini with three adults, all wearing life jackets."

If someone is injured, mention that. If you don't get an immediate response, continue to periodically send out a Mayday broadcast as long as the radio will function, taking care to give your position with every transmission. If time permits, scan through the other channels and interrupt any radio traffic you hear with your Mayday broadcast. If you don't hear traffic, try transmitting on Coast Guard Channel 22A.

Sending out a Mayday call is only to be used for when a person, or boat is threatened by grave or imminent danger, and requires assistance.

The other two calls are PAN-PAN and SECURITE.

PAN-PAN - (pronounced pahn-pahn) is used to signal urgent information, like when someone has fallen overboard, or a boat is drifting onto shore or into a busy shipping channel. If your emergency isn't immediately life threatening, say Pan-Pan instead of Mayday.

SECURITE - (pronounced sea-cur-i-tay) is the safety signal. This is used to transmit information about the safety of navigation. For instance, if a large commercial vessel is coming into the Kenosha Harbor Channel, or a log is floating that would severely damage a vessel. Then this signal would be used. It can also be used to transmit weather information, such as when a powerful storm system is approaching.

Let's all hope we never have to use these calls. But now we are prepared to effectively communicate in case we do.



## Nautical Flag History: Nautical Flag Meanings & International Signals Part 2!!!

### Nautical Boating Flags

Flags are used to identify a vessel. The three flags traditionally used are:

- The national ensign (country)
- The yacht club burgee (fleet)
- A private signal (master)

These are used primarily on recreational vessels. Some boaters are criticized for using flags too recreationally as flags should only be used to send a message about the boat such as:

- Nationality
- Maneuvering situation
- Club affiliation
- Office held



### Identification Flags

The preferred United States national ensign is a "50-star" or "Old Glory" flag. The ensign is used to represent the country of the vessel's registry. In domestic waters, some vessels prefer to fly the following:

- **U.S. Yacht Ensign**: Features a blue canton with 13 white stars surrounding an anchor atop horizontal red and white stripes.
- U.S. Power Squadron Ensign: A red canton with 13 white stars surrounding an anchor atop vertical white and blue stripes. This flag can be flown on boats with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Ensign (a blue ensign) to indicate the owner is affiliated with both the U.S. and the Coast Guard.

### Warning Flags

Other flags used on recreation vessels are intended to serve as warning to other vessels:

- Hurricane Warning Flag announces that sustained winds of 74 mph or higher are expected within the coastal area.
- Skin Diver Down River Flag is legally required to be used by divers to indicate their activities and diving area.
- Fun & Fish Flags
  - Some flags are used to serve a more decorative purpose. For example, the Jolly Roger, or pirate flag, famously features skull and crossbones on black canvas. Originally used to indicate no mercy when taking over ships, many who fly a Jolly Roger do so for sport, though only in domestic waters.

Other novelty flags include: 19<sup>th</sup> Hole Flag, Beer Flag, Coffee Time Flag, Cocktail Flag, over 30 different Fish Flags (based on what you are good at catching).




## Welcome to the NEW NWSA Library



1. Click on the Tiny Cat link in the Resource Section.



 If you enter a search word or phrase, Tiny Cat will show you all the books meeting that criteria. Click on the book if you want to see more detail.



2. In Tiny Cat, you have 3 options. Perform a Search, click on a scrolling book cover, or click on the link below the search bar to view the cover page of all books.

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4. You can read the details about a book. If you like it, click on place hold.

Learn how to understand and use the right information to make good decisions about pending weather conditions – for you, your boat, and your crew. Read the clouds, sky, and wind to predict what is coming and prepare. Discuss how to stay informed and exercise good judgement for a great safe-boating experience whether cruising or racing.

Instructor Rebecca Hansen is a meteorologist for the Milwaukee/Sullivan National Weather Service Office in Dousman, WI. There, she helps her team provide weather support for 20 counties in southern and eastern Wisconsin along with the open waters of Lake Michigan and the nearshore waters from Sheboygan to Winthrop Harbor.
